The Awards were for “Community-Led Prevention and Preparedness” and the big one for the night, the “RACV Insurance Award for Excellence”, which came with a cheque for \$5000.00. The money will be used to further develop our work in this area.




North East CMA, Indigo Shire and Yack Sports Park for supporting this event.

“Rodenator” Rabbit warren destruction demonstration at Bruarong – Saturday 7th May



The rabbit is a serious environmental and agricultural pest and can impact on farm productivity and native ecosystems, leading to financial loss and environmental destruction. Whilst the release of the virus booster in 2016/2017 will reduce rabbit numbers, the virus needs to be combined with destruction of warrens. Pest Smart states that: **“Warren destruction is the most important part of lasting rabbit control.”** Warren ripping is one method, the use of the rodenator is another. Each has particular advantages depending on site conditions.

Dear Peter & Rhonda,

On behalf of the Creightons Creek Landcare Group, I would like to thank you and the Kiewa Catchment Landcare Groups for the use of your fencing equipment and trailer.

Almost this time last year, we had the Creighton Creek Valley experience a terrible fire which destroyed vast areas of natural environment and farm land. We knew that the fencing trailer existed because Steve and Sarah told us about the generous purchase that was made by one of your Landcare groups when you experienced fires several years ago. After a phone call to the Crookes, we then contacted you, the arrangements were made – and you brought it down for us! Thank-you very much on behalf of the fire affected families.

All the things you said about people being in shock and not knowing what to do happened here. Some of our friends whose farms were burnt ran a field morning with Waratah where the machine was demonstrated and guidelines were established. Some farms had assistance from prisoners who were trained and experienced with the machine and we had excellent reports on the men and the machine. Other farmers who used it themselves were very grateful as well.

At our Landcare AGM last night, we passed a vote of thanks to you and your Landcare Groups' generosity and forward thinking in recovering land use after destructive fires.
